TIPS FOR ACADEMIC SUCCESS

Counseling Services

The University of Evansville's Counseling Services is committed to providing mental health services to students in order to help them achieve their academic and personal goals and to enhance their college experience. Counseling Services assists many students with acute mental health concerns and provides education about general wellness as part of the college experience.

Counseling Services is located on the second floor of the Ridgway University Center, first door on the left upon entering the Student Life Suite, and offers Mental Health Counseling, Disability Services, and Wellness Resources.

Mental Health Counseling

The primary focus of Counseling Services is to provide general, short-term counseling that assists students in identifying barriers and setting goals while improving coping strategies to achieve personal and academic goals.

Personal, individual counseling is available for acute needs such as*:

- Mood and/or personal issues: anxiety, depression, loneliness, grief, self-esteem
- Relationship issues: partners, roommates, teammates, classmates, family
- Developmental issues: adjustment, transitions, identity concerns
- Academic issues: motivation, test-taking concerns/anxiety,
- Other issues: trauma, assault, acute substance misuse
- Career/future exploration

Disability Services

The Office of Disability Services coordinates the provision of appropriate and reasonable academic accommodations and support services for any qualified student with a properly documented disability.

To ensure access for all students with disabilities, Disability Services staff members work closely with each student and the University community to develop and coordinate the implementation of appropriate accommodations. Accommodations vary depending on the nature of the disability and are determined on an individual basis.
